



The S&P 500 Index continued to climb in the final quarter of 2025, making this the third consecutive year of double-digit growth. Mixed economic data began to trickle out following the government shutdown in October. While GDP growth surprised on the upside, the job market weakened. The bond market took note of wavering employment and weaker home sales, which also supported the Fed cutting interest rates by 0.25% in December. The AI theme remained strong, yet investors became more selective this quarter as they reflected upon expanding valuations and the durability of lofty AI infrastructure spending.

### STRATEGY PERFORMANCE

The top 5 performance contributors were Lumentum Holdings Inc. (LITE), Axsome Therapeutics Inc. (AXSM), Insmid Incorporated (INSM), JFrog Limited (FROG), and Madrigal Pharmaceuticals Inc. (MDGL).

Lumentum continued to beat expectations and raise guidance. The company’s optical products are experiencing surging demand as server bandwidth expands in data center and AI related applications. Axsome continued to execute on its commercial depression drug Auvelity and is making strides on extending its pipeline. Insmid impressed with a patient script count that came in way ahead of expectations for its first commercial drug, ARIKAYCE. The stock has been a big winner all year. JFrog reported its biggest cloud segment growth of the year, with accelerating usage trends. Madrigal’s REZDIFFRA got extended IP protection and launch growth is on target for an impressive 2026.

The largest 5 performance detractors were e.l.f. Beauty Inc. (ELF), Adtalem Global Education Inc. (ATGE), Magnite Inc. (MGNI), i3 Verticals Inc. (IIIV), and Kontoor Brands Inc. (KTB).

While cosmetic company e.l.f. Beauty continues to grow ahead of its category, growth expectations have moderated. Additional uncertainty surrounding tariffs was also an issue. Adtalem reported temporary issues with enrollment at their Chamberlain division that spooked investors. Magnite gave conservative guidance due to headwinds in the Connected TV space. We remain optimistic yet acknowledge a bumpier ride. i3 Verticals lowered fiscal year guidance, not a first miss for this company. Kontoor was hurt by December’s retail inventory data and concerns that Q4 gross margin expectations were aggressive.

As measured by contribution to return, the top contributors and bottom detractors represent the best and worst performing securities held by the Strategy based on the position weight and total return of each Strategy holding. Securities are ranked by each position’s Individual Performance impact on the Strategy’s return for the analysis period. The contributors and detractors are listed in the order of their non-weighted total return.

### STRATEGY ACTIVITY

The Strategy added AAR Corporation (AIR), Advanced Energy Industries Inc. (AEIS), DoubleVerify Holdings Inc. (DV), JFrog Limited (FROG), Braze Inc. (BRZE), DigitalOcean Holdings Inc. (DOCN), Mirum Pharmaceuticals Inc. (MIRM), and Zymeworks Inc. (ZYME).

AAR Corporation manages maintenance, repair and overhaul (MRO), parts supply, and other logistics and support primarily for commercial airlines, defense, and government customers. We see structural tailwinds from recovering global air traffic and aging fleets needing more maintenance combined with steady defense and government services demand that provide counter cyclical stability. Advanced Energy Industries provides advanced power-conversion

and control systems used in semiconductor manufacturing, industrial production, and data-center infrastructure. The company has direct leverage to semiconductor capital expenditure cycles and AI driven data center buildouts. DoubleVerify is a software and analytics provider for digital advertising verification and benefits from a long term growth tailwind as ad spend keeps shifting to digital and CTV, where verification is critical. JFrog offers a cloud platform for software and security developers that enables continuous updating. JFrog is employing AI in its stack flow with success and management is executing ahead of street estimates. Braze offers a cloud customer engagement platform for customer-centric industries, leveraging AI for efficiency. DigitalOcean is a cloud infrastructure provider that targets small and mid-sized businesses, their platform simplifies deploying, scaling, and scaling applications with Droplets and managed databases. Mirum Pharmaceuticals is a biopharmaceutical company focused on therapies for rare liver diseases, particularly cholestatic liver diseases in both pediatric and adult patients. Its pipeline targets indications with high unmet medical need. Lastly, Zymeworks is a biopharmaceutical company with exposure to innovative oncology assets and platform technologies that can be partnered widely.

During the quarter the Strategy sold Verint Systems Inc. (VRNT), Simply Good Foods Company (SMPL), Veeco Instruments Inc. (VECO), Cactus Inc. (WHD), CSG Systems International Inc. (CSGS), Integral Ad Science Holding Corporation (IAS), i3 Verticals Inc. Class A (IIIV), and Insmmed Incorporated (INSM).

Verint was bought by private equity firm Thoma Bravo. The stock jumped on the announcement in the third quarter and the deal closed in November. Simply Good Foods is experiencing margin pressure despite its sales growth, and management did note softening growth in key brands, meanwhile Consumer Staples is a shrinking sector now weighted less than 2% of the Russell 2000 Index. Veeco delivered strong Q3 results driven by substantial orders for wet processing systems from AI and high-performance computing customers, resulting in record semiconductor segment revenue and expanded margins. The valuation reflects this good news, and margin risk lies ahead as they plan to merge with Axcelis (ACLS). Cactus is a top well-head services provider domestically, rig counts continue to fall, and the Energy sector weight has dropped dramatically, causing us to drop the holding.

CSG Systems is a provider of cloud based customer experience, billing, and payments software and services. The company was bought out by Japanese tech firm, NEC, and the stock jumped on the offer. Integral Ad Science, a digital advertising verification company, agreed to an all-cash buyout by a private equity firm at a 20%+ premium over its prior close. i3 Verticals, a provider of integrated payment and software solutions focusing on specific verticals such as public sector, education, healthcare, and business to business end markets, was sold. The company has missed more than once on its earnings guidance and we chose to exit. Lastly, Insmmed is a biopharmaceutical company focused on therapies for serious and rare pulmonary and inflammatory diseases, such as refractory nontuberculous mycobacterial (NTM) lung disease and other respiratory conditions. The stock now trades at a less compelling valuation and was sold into this price strength.

## OUTLOOK

A more accommodative Fed, continuing AI growth, and a broadening of the market later in the quarter are supportive of equity and bond market performances. We continue to seek strong relative valuations across sectors with a focus on productivity driven earnings growth. Tariffs and geopolitical concerns add the potential for market volatility in 2026.
